The Council would like to thank the Church Wardens and Rev. Robert Quarton of St Thomas Parish Church,



Heage Band and the Somercotes Guides, Brownies and Rainbows and all those who assisted to make a very successful evening. A collection was held for Councillor Paul Smith's chosen Charity, Cancer Research UK. Abig Thankyou to all who attended and helped to raise £200.

Parish 'Council Tax' (Precept) - 2% increase

The Parish Council has held the council tax for 3 years whilst taking on increased responsibilities through careful management and implementing cost savings. In 2015 the council will be required to pay for 50% of the Parliamentary Election cost, for the first time that has put further pressure on budgets for 2015-16. Councillor Paul Smith (Chairman) said, "The council is acutely aware of the demands on household budgets and through careful management it has not increased council tax for 3 years through the implementation of cost savings, but due to the increased cost of service provision a 2% rise has been agreed." The Council tax (precept) for 2015-16 will increase from £137,676.00 to £140,410.00. The council tax increase for Band 'D' properties will be £1.99 per annum."

The Parish Council employs 6 staff (2 full time) – Responsibilities include, street cleaning, gardening footpath clearance, monthly skip provision and general maintenance services by the Parish wardens; operates the Village Hall, at affordable prices, employing a caretaker & bar supervisor. Other responsibilities include maintaining Market Place & Mill Yard car parks, the lighting columns on the recreation ground, 11 bus shelters; festive lighting, a quarterly newsletter and providing local services for the benefit of the community. The administration of the Council is the responsibility of the Clerk/RFO & Assistant Clerk to the Council.

Making Space for Wildlife

Your Council has identified a second area for improvement, the roadside verge outside of B&Q on Nottingham Road (B600). This is a key route and gateway to the Somercotes area, which we aim to make aesthetically pleasing whilst being sympathetic to environmental considerations. This cultivation is in addition to the planting at the Winding Wheel on Nottingham Road.

We have been granted a licence to cultivate this verge from Derbyshire County Council and will maintain it henceforth.

We are considering a Long Season Meadow type planting which will provide a blend of both spring and summer flowers.



This is how the area looks now. By late Spring/Summer the meadow should be in full bloom.

The meadows should attract bees, butterflies and other pollinators. Bees have lost much of their natural habitat and are under assault from pesticides and intensive farming. Councillor Paul Smith (Chairman) says 'We have been encouraged to act, by the news about the serious decline of pollinating insects in Britain and are proud to be contributing to creating bee and butterfly friendly places'.

Community Area for Development

The Parish Council is committed to improving the local area and has taken on a number of initiatives; including wild flower areas, repainting the winding wheel, improving the Festive Lights displays and car park resurfacing. The next project, on Market Place, Somercotes is scheduled for 2015-16 is making a feature area, on the footprint of the former toilet area. The Council invites the community to come forward with ideas and designs – walls, planters, seats, floral displays – have you any great ideas? If you would like to suggest how best to improve this



area of land then call in at the Parish Council Office (Village Hall), with your ideas. This is a great area to improve the central area of the village, alongside the village hall.

Letter from your **County Councillor**

Dear Resident

I am pleased to say funding has been secured for speed activated 30 mph signing on Leabrooks Road with one sign being sited on the junction of Victoria Street on the approach to Leabrooks and another one near to Wood Street/Sherwood Street on the approach to Somercotes. They are the same as the ones on Sleetmoor Lane and Somercotes Hill

We have recently had improvements made to bus shelters throughout Somercotes with the glass areas reduced and solid panels put into the bottom half of the shelters to reduce the cost of replacing the glass, if damaged.

In terms of highways, Victoria Street will be surface dressed in the Spring/Summer. Leabrooks Road is due to be patched out with that again being surface dressed, in due course. Castle Drive footways will be resurfaced this year, as well as Hathersage Drive footways in February/March this year.

The work on the drainage system outside the medical centre (Nottingham Road) has been completed to stop the road and pavement from flooding in the future. We have also improved the drainage on Sleetmoor Lane that has also experienced flooding.

Works on Sleetmoor Wood have been taking place to create a circular route from the new entrance to link both of the bridleways together.

New benches have been installed the Pennytown Ponds Nature Reserve, as part of to improve the seating areas around the ponds. The floating reed beds are to be replanted and a new one installed and work is taking place with the Environment Agency and Severn Trent to install a filtration system at the top pond to capture the water to take out any possible pollutants and silt before it gets into the ponds. This is all to help improve the water quality.


Another Big Thank you to the public and local **businesses Somercotes**



'Lest We Forget - A Community at War'

Somercotes Parish Council has been awarded £3,700.00, by the Heritage Lottery Fund, to research WW1 in Somercotes and how the local community played its part. Intense research will be conducted on the fallen servicemen whose names appear on the Somercotes War memorial, as well as, other who do not.

The research group are asking if anyone has any photographs of any of the named servicemen, service records, enlistment papers, demob papers, letters or postcards or any other WW1 memorabilia. Other important aspects of the war research revolve around what those left behind in the community did to support the war effort, particularly the women. We know that many women worked at the Ironworks whilst others went to work in munitions factories in Nottingham, or worked on the land, but have little information about this. This is a 2 year project and a booklet will be written in 2016 to commemorate the Parish of Somercotes (includes Pye Bridge & Leabrooks) contribution to WW1. The research group is asking for your help so please bring along anything you have that can support the research to the Parish Council Office, at the Village Hall, Somercotes.

Somercotes Local **History Society Presents:**

John Hales (SLHS) has been working with group members and Dennis Lemon (son of the last miller, at the Mills) to produce a presentation on the famous Riddings Windmills, built in 1877. There are a lot of rumours and tales about the mills and this makes a compelling historical story. William Lemon made a matchstick model of the mills (around 2000) and his brother Dennis has presented this to SLHS and this is a feature of the presentation. The Mills were a landmark for miles around and towered above Somercotes. It is planned to hold the presentation on the Riddings Windmills in early April 2015, so look out for posters providing the date & location – 'Don't Miss It'.

£5k funding to help tackle youth offending

An initiative for diversionary sports activities, by Somerlea Park Community Centre, to help to reduce crime and antisocial behaviour in the area has been successful in receiving funding from the Police and Crime Commissioner grants of £3k. In addition, at its meeting on 21st November, the Parish Council resolved to support the initiative with a further grant of £2k. Together with funding of £1k from the Community Centre itself, the sum of £5k will be of great benefit in designing structured sporting activities for young people to divert those from crime and anti-social behaviour and help to increase community safety.

The Council appeals to drivers to respect the disabled spaces that are provided for those with reduced mobility.


