You may all be aware of the sudden sad passing away of Gordon Blackmore, Clerk to the Parish Council and Councillor Cyril Langton, a long standing Member of Somercotes Parish Council

Both were dedicated to improving Somercotes, giving their time and energy, to the community. It was a pleasure to have known both Gordon and Cyril and to have worked alongside them for a number of years.

We saw the build of Somerlea Park Centre, made improvements to the Recreation Ground and improved Festive Lighting. Gordon did much work on our behalf to retain the Somercotes Car Parks free of charge by getting a legal agreement with Amber valley Borough Council for the Parish Council to take over the Car Parks, this was not an easy task and involved some very skilled negotiating and complex issues.

Gordon also facilitated the improvements to the Village Hall to include refurbishments of the toilets, new roof, new entrance hall and decoration. These are just a very few of the projects and initiatives undertook.

Gordon and Cyril were also very involved with Riddings Cricket Club. Gordon was the steer for Somercotes Local History Society (SLHS), many residents purchased calendars from the Council, which were produced by the SLHS.



Match consisted of current Riddings 11 vs a past players 11. Some fabulous raffle prizes were on offer. A bouncy castle was set up, a BBQ was on the go and the bar was open all day. An amazing £1300 was raised for Macmillan.


Richard Fenn of Riddings CC said "We want to give Gordon a send-off deserved of a man who did so much in years gone by for the club and community".

Letter from your County Councillor

I am pleased to say that Hathersage Drive footways have now been resurfaced. High Street, Leabrooks Road, Victoria Street, Lower Somercotes and Pye Bridge have been patched out and surface dressed. After a problem with yellow lining on Victoria St, the roads are now greatly improved against reducing budgets! I am still awaiting works to be carried out on Castle Drive to improve the footways.

The new speed activated signs are now installed and operating on Leabrooks Rd and Riddings, I hope this is helping to highlight that these are 30 mph zones and drivers comply. I am pleased to see that the corridor at the Junior School has now been fully enclosed. A number of parents had spoken to me about it being used as a cloakroom. I am pleased to say that I have been able to secure the funding required to make the improvement to the building.

Funding has also been allocated for roofing works at the Somercotes Infants School this financial year. If your children attend the Riddings area schools monies have been allocated for new classrooms and new roof at the Junior School.

As part of the council's budget reduction of £157m every department has to reduce its spending. Street Lighting has now commenced its programme of turning off certain lights from midnight to dawn to reduce the growing energy bill. The areas identified were subject to a review of: crime figures; OAP complexes; road traffic accident figures; before switch off. If crime figures were high in a particular area, the switch off did not apply. The Community Safety Partnership will be reviewing the crime data.

On the subject of lighting – the telegraph pole mounted lights on Sleetmoor Lane near ADASC football pitches have been replaced with new LCD lamp columns, which will provide better light due to the overhead cables being sited underground.

At the Meeting on 15th May 2015, the Chairman reported on:

The refurbishment of the Village Hall toilets, a much better toilet facility now available for users of the Village Hall. The continued facility of free car parking and the provision of monthly skips has continued.

The Parish Wardens have weighed in the scrap metal from the skips, this is to be donated to a Charity of their choice. The Market Place Car Park has been re-surfaced and re lined. The wildflower meadow on Nottingham Road (Winding Wheel) is now seeded and plants ordered for planting the verge outside B&Q.

The Chairman thanked Les & Colin (Parish Wardens), who are an asset to the Council, who approach their work as no job too big or too small. Due to their excellent work in partnership with DCC (Sleetmoor Woods), DCC are now offering additional work to them under the same terms.

The Chairman thanked all returning councillors and new councillors for their support in making the Somercotes area a better place to live, work and visit

Jan 12th A domino drive was held in Somercotes Church Hall for the local LADS SOCK FUND.

Jan 19th Mrs Shooter has received information from her husband L/CPL Shooter to say he was wounded in the arm and leg when he landed with the Paratroopers at Arnhem in September and was taken prisoner. Mrs Shooter resides with her parents Mr & Mrs Millington in Coupland Place and has a one week old daughter.

Jan 19th Robert Townsend 34, a miner of Smedley Avenue Somercotes was fined £10 with £1 6s 4d costs for stealing 4 fowls valued at £5 10s between December 22nd and 25th from Mrs Gladys Mabel Bond of Somercotes. He admitted to having killed 3 Rhode Island Red pullets and a cockerel and he gave one to an 'evacuee from Southend'. In Court Townsend said he was sorry.

May 11th The War against Germany lasted 2094 days. 526 longer than WW1.

May 11th Somercotes Church Hall was the venue for a Victory Dance. Wylie Price & his All Star Band – 10 musicians and 3 vocalists.

June 29th Somercotes and Leabrooks Wardens joined by representatives of Lower Somercotes & Pye Bridge wound up their ARP activities in magnificent style with a grand farewell party on Wednesday evening. The Church Hall under the capable chairmanship of the Head warden Mr E Best and some 100 persons attended.

July 13th Crich Beacon has been illuminated after an absence of 5 years.

The Walter Scott Lodge RAOB Somercotes, entertained 50 children and their parents to a VE Celebration with tea & social at the Devonshire Arms. Nurse Brewster made a cake an all children received 1s and crisps and ice cream were distributed. Mr Bradley was C for the games. An enjoyable time was sent.

July 27th During the War 1400 high explosives and 8350 incendiary bombs were dropped on Derbyshire, excluding Derby & Chesterfield. The highest casualties were at Tupton with 11 fatalities.

Aug 10th

The most fearful weapon mankind has ever known was released against Japan on Monday morning. It was the world's first Atomic Bomb. It is expected to bring the Japanese War to a sudden end.

Aug 17th

Bonfires and fireworks celebrated the surrender of the Japanese on Wednesday night, in Somercotes and Leabrooks.

Sept 7th Dorothy Dawes has been awarded a free place at Swanwick Grammar school and will commence next term with pupils who have won scholarships.

Sept 28th In the presence of thousands cheering & flag waving people of all ages, the King & Queen opened the new £6 million reservoir of the Derwent Valley Water board (Ladybower).

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St Thomas Church: Swan & Emblem

Mr Peter Bird of Chesterfield has kindly contributed this article in response to a request by Mrs Phyllis Smith of the swan's origins:

The china swan is what is generally referred to as 'crested china'. It is very poignant that this item has appeared now as it dates from around or just after WWI

Collecting crested china was a craze that started during the Edwardian period when the general population started to travel more, by railways and the proliferation of motor transport. These items were bought and collected as cheap souvenirs. Originally they were made in Germany but it wasn't long before the potteries of Stoke on Trent started to produce them and then solely once WWI had started. Representatives of the manufacturers went round towns & villages all over the country selling their wares to shops large and small, from Post Offices and Stationers to Gents Hairdressers and Fancy Goods Dealers. Crested china came in all shapes and sizes, small vases, buildings, historical items, animals, comical figures, the list is almost endless. The most well-known and easily recognisable pieces are those made of items from WW1.



Tanks, guns, Fighterplanes, Battleships, ammunition, Soldiers and Sailors etc. etc. Pieces often have a retailer's mark underneath as well as the manufacturer and sometimes if you look carefully you can still see the original price in pencil on this unglazed area! Where a town or village didn't have a Coat of Arms, like Somercotes, the manufacturer invented one using a local landmark or similar with a combination of other armorial devices such as the crown and rose. The crest 'invented' for Clay Cross is identical to that of Somercotes except for the church! The popularity of crested china waned during the 1920's and most companies had ceased producing by 1928. Quite why anyone would want a souvenir of the horrors of WW1 or a souvenir of a visit to Somercotes seems odd to us today. Other crests that can be found are Riddings, Leabrooks, Alfreton, Ironville, South Normanton & Ripley to name just a few in the locality. Some of these items are now prized by collectors, whilst not generally of great value they are a fascinating piece of social history. The swan was probably made by Arcadian China and would be worth £10 - £20.
